The CoC considered these factors when determining whether projects should receive full or reduced funding: alignment w & adherence to HUD priorities; HUD monitoring findings; degree to which the program & agency promote equity; data quality; attainment of objective performance targets; degree of system-level need for the project (i.e., extent to which reducing or eliminating could create service gap or deficiency), financial performance, & cost-effectiveness. The 5-person Evaluation Panel noted AUW app showed numerous deficiencies in dq & ability to expend funds. Members of the CoC Advisory Board reviewed & approved decision to reduce & reallocate part of project's funds. PIC sent AUW notification October 28, 2021 & posted decision to PIC website and October 28, 2021 & PIC listserv November 1, 2021.
