City and County of Honolulu	Consolidated PH	The Consolidated Permanent Housing grant renewal project is submitted by the City and County of Honolulu, originally as three Shelter Plus Care grants which were combined to focus on assisting those that are the most vulnerable. Overview of the three programs (1) Steadfast Housing Development Corp's Permanent Housing program provides tenant based rental assistance (TBRA) to 101 individuals in 101 scattered site units comprised of 49 studio apartments and 52 one-bedroom units; (2) Kalihi - Palama Health Center (KPHC) The New Beginnings project is a TBRA PH project that consists of 165 units; (3) IHS, Home At Last carries an 80 unit TBRA scattered site permanent supportive housing project. All three of these programs use a Housing First model that collectively plan to serve 86% chronically homeless individuals and provide housing as well as support services to each client. US Vets	PSH Veterans and Fam	United States Veterans Initiative (U.S. VETS) - SHP entitled Permanent Supportive Housing for Chronically Homeless Veterans and Families provides housing for single, adult veterans and families with a history of long-term homelessness. Twenty (20) scattered-site leased units include efficiency, 2 and 3 bedroom apartments for families and group shared-living house for three single veterans while providing supportive services. The Institute for Human Services	Home Sweet Home	Home Sweet Home is a Shelter Plus Care (S+C) program provides 6 units and 8 beds or scattered site rental assistance specifically targeting homeless couples and will emphasize the benefits of maintaining supportive relationships and social networks as well as mutual caretaking. Case Managers and the Housing Specialist will bring attention to these focus areas in service plans and facilitate access to targeted services for couples if needed. The Institute for Human Services	PSH 2015	IHS's New Permanent Supportive Housing will provide 33 beds where 100% of clients are chronically homeless, have a disabling medical, psychiatric, or substance abuse condition, and qualify based on vulnerability measured by the VI-SPDAT. A hybrid approach to rental assistance will be used, with very low income clients paying a 30% share of rent and incorporating partial "shallow subsidies" for those with higher incomes who will pay up to 40% of income toward rent. Program design emphasizes outreach, housing search, relocation service and rental assistance. The \$494,772 is to be used for rental assistance and administrative costs. Mental Health Kokua	Safe Haven	Mental Health Kokua program - Hearth Safe Haven, a 25-bed permanent housing project in Downtown Honolulu, based in the Housing First model. Focus is to provide assertive case management and wrap-around support while immediately moving vulnerable individuals into housing. The leased facility is a SRO, with 24-hour residential staff providing assistance and training on the skills necessary for independent living. Projected outcomes include increasing participant's self-sufficiency, obtaining permanent housing and maintaining stable housing. Additionally, provide outreach in Honolulu's Downtown/Chinatown area. Steadfast Housing	Headway House	The Headway House Supportive Housing Program in Kalaehoa provides a 40 bed SRO building of long term rental housing and support services to homeless seriously and persistently mentally ill adult consumers and a live in resident manager. This project is directed to consumers who are able to benefit from case management services and who desire and/or capable and willing to live in a semi-supervised and least restrictive setting possible. The Institute for Human Services	No Place Like Home	IHS's No Place Like Home program is a 17-unit permanent supportive housing project targeting chronically homeless with Severe Mental Illness to obtain appropriate permanent housing without subsidy. SMI (schizophrenia, bipolar disorder) affects 80% of participants, with the remaining having one or more disabilities including substance abuse and severe physical disabilities in addition to co-occurring mental illness. The Institute for Human Services	Home Sweet Home II	Home Sweet Home II is a Shelter Plus Care (S+C) program provides 7 units of scattered site rental assistance specifically targeting homeless couples and will emphasize the benefits of maintaining supportive relationships and social networks as well as mutual caretaking. Case Managers and the Housing Specialist will bring attention to these focus areas in service plans and facilitate access to targeted services for couples if needed. US Vets	Leeward PSH	US Vets' Leeward Permanent Supportive Program will house prioritized Chronically Homeless veteran and non-veteran individuals and families who reside on the Leeward side of Oahu. The awarded funds will go towards outreach, engagement, and assessment of chronically homeless households; long-term housing subsidies and on-going case management supportive services; delivery of housing specialist services to identify and facilitate signing of a lease by household that meets desired housing type and location. US Vets	Kalaeloa	United States Veterans Initiative - The Kalaeloa Permanent Housing for Homeless Veterans with Disabilities provides permanent housing coupled with long-term supportive case management services with 9 SRO units and 4 scattered site leased housing to chronically homeless veterans (male and female).
